## **America in the World (AW)**

The Miller Center is pleased to announce a new program, *America in the World* (AW). The United States shapes -- and is shaped by -- an increasingly interdependent world. This new program's mission is to encourage scholarship, understanding, and informed public debate on America's global activities. It aims to develop the Miller Center as a national resource for the study of U.S. foreign policy, great power politics, and the effect of globalization on the United States.

*America in the World* will build on the domestic policy focus of the *American Political Development* (APD) program. AW seeks to address the external view of the Janus-faced American presidency. The program will collaborate with APD to explore the impact of international involvement on the United States. AW will help give the Miller Center a strong analytical and historical foundation. While addressing pressing national issues, it also aspires to shape the scholarly agenda of the academe.

AW will sponsor a conference on **U.S. Foreign Policy after the Bush Doctrine** on June 7-8, 2007. In addition to the conference, AW will hold two panel discussions to address practical issues facing American foreign policy. The first will take place on December 1, 2006, on the future of the **U.S.-China Relationship**. The second panel, scheduled for February 2007, will focus on **Oil and U.S. Foreign Policy**.

In collaboration with the APD program, AW will present speakers in the existing colloquium series. On November 3, 2006, **Peter Trubowitz** of the University of Texas, Austin, will address **The End of the U.S. Liberal Internationalist Compact**. Future colloquia participants include **Nick Cullather**, a historian at Indiana University, who will speak on **Administrative Capacity and U.S. Foreign Policy**; and **Lynn Eden**, of the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies at Stanford University, who will examine **Intelligence and Foreign Policy in the Wake of 9/11**.

To encourage new scholars working on America's role in the world, AW will offer fellowships on U.S. foreign policy and world politics through the Miller Center Fellows program.

*America in the World* is co-directed by UVA faculty Melvyn Leffler, the Edward R. Stettinius professor in the Department of History, and Jeffrey W.
